

CAMDEN HUNT, SOLOIST

Camden Hunt was born and raised in Denton, Texas, a city named a Music Friendly City by the Texas Music Office. He is a recent graduate of the University of North Texas College of Music with a Music Performance Trumpet Concentration Degree. While he was in college, he began writing music, and several of his pieces have been commissioned, including a 2017 world premiere of "In the Presence of Greatness" in memory of Keith Johnson, a long-time Professor at UNT. Camden is currently writing a musical series based on personal experience in nature to compliment his interest in the outdoors and his experiences as an Eagle Scout.

Camden began playing all over the country with the Jordan Khan Orchestra and the Denton First Methodist Mosaic Worship Band while he was still in college. He continues to play with those groups, along with the Zgomot Slop Balkan Brass Band. He also plays with small jazz groups. Camden sings, plays trumpet, and whistles entire jazz standards. He plans to move to New York City in the fall of 2020.

PROGRAM NOTES

Since its founding in 1802, the US Military Academy, known as West Point, has been educating an enviable list of notable American leaders that include Ulysses S. Grant, William Pershing, Douglas MacArthur, Dwight D. Eisenhower, and George Patton. Each graduate is a commissioned leader, committed to the values of Duty, Honor, and Country. The march *STEADFAST LEADERSHIP* was composed to honor the West Point Class of 1956, of which General H. Norman Schwarzkopf was a member, on their 50th Reunion.

The Nordic countries are generally considered to include Iceland, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, and Finland, and a wealth of folk music can be found in Nordic (Scandinavian) song. Three giants of American band music - Frank Erickson, Albert Oliver Davis, and Alfred Reed - combined to create a work exploring the rich heritage of peasant songs and instrumental pieces that have survived through the centuries. *Movement II: Fantasie on a Danish Theme* from *A NORDIC TRILOGY* highlights the lyrical lines of Nordic song.

SUITE OF OLD AMERICAN DANCES by Robert Russell Bennett (1894–1981) is an original composition in which the composer sought to recreate the mood of a Saturday night barn dance from his childhood in Kansas City. Two of the five dances he set to music are featured this afternoon:

Schottische – This dance is a German variant of several Bohemian dances that later developed into the polka. The dance came to America by way of England when polkas were the rage in the 1840's among the society crowd.

Rag – The suite ends with a rag, although no one specific dance can be associated with the rag style. Perhaps Bennett's choice is representative of a new era beginning in the 20th century and a new generation ready to embrace novel and even controversial ideas.

His name was Ray Charles, but they called him the "genius" and the "father of soul." With perfect pitch and an expressive voice, he combined the worlds of jazz, country, rhythm and blues and changed the face of contemporary music. He took home 17 Grammy Awards and was honored with the Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award before he died in 2004. Yet hits such as "I Can't Stop Loving you," "Let the Good Times Roll," or "Georgia on My Mind" are inspiring new generations of fans. The iconic music of this American treasure is found in *THE GENIUS OF RAY CHARLES*.

Roger Voisin, then principal trumpet of the Boston Pops Orchestra, asked Leroy Anderson (1908-1975) for a solo work that wasn't the usual loud, martial trumpet piece. Anderson responded with a quiet melody based on bugle notes played by the trumpet with the accompanying ensemble providing a gentle background. *THE TRUMPETER'S LULLABY* was first performed on May 9, 1950, with Voisin as soloist and Arthur Fiedler conducting the Boston Pops. It is now a staple of the instrument's repertoire.

In December of 2018 George Jones retired as the Fine Arts Director of the Garland Independent School District after a long and successful career as a teacher and administrator. His friends and colleagues honored George with a commissioned work by William Pitts (1986 -) titled *FIDELIS*. Meaning "faithful," the work is loosely based on phrases from John Philip Sousa's *SEMPRE FIDELIS* ("Always Faithful") and is a living thank you for a life of inspiration and devotion to music and arts education.

ALL OF ME is a jazz standard written in 1931 and first recorded by actress and singer Ruth Etting, known as "America's Sweetheart of Song." It has become one of the most recorded songs of its era, with notable versions by the Count Basie Orchestra, Louis Armstrong, Ella Fitzgerald, Dean Martin, Frank Sinatra and even Willie Nelson. In 2000, **ALL OF ME** was presented the Towering Song Award by the Songwriters Hall of Fame.

In 2008, the RCB wanted to express its thanks and appreciation to Conductor George Jones for 25 years of dedication and service to the band, but what do you buy? The answer soon became obvious – give him music! Acclaimed composer John Wasson (1956 -) was commissioned to create a work that would capture some of George's jovial personality. The result was the exciting *SILVER CELEBRATION OVERTURE* that had its world premiere at Richardson's Eisemann Center. Not only has this score been a unique gift to George and the Richardson Community Band, but its publication allows bands to enjoy the work for years to come.

"Leader of the Band was written for my father Lawrence Fogelberg who was a musician, educator, and band leader. I was so gratified that I was able to give him that song before he passed on," wrote Dan Fogelberg (1951-2007). The American musician, songwriter, and composer released LEADER OF THE BAND on his 1981 album The Innocent Age, and the tribute song peaked at #9 on the Billboard Hot 100 list in March of 1982. It became Fogelberg's second #1 song on the music charts following his 1980 hit Longer.

John Philip Sousa composed *WHO'S WHO IN NAVY BLUE* after a request from midshipman W.A. Ingram, president of the class of 1920 at the U.S. Naval Academy. It had become a custom for each graduating class to have its own new song or march performed at graduation, and the class of 1920 bettered all other classes with their invitation to America's March King. Sousa had served in the Navy in World War I and the military connection undoubtedly had a great deal to do with his acceptance.. The march is dedicated to Tecumseh, the famous Indian statue that stands outside Bancroft Hall at the Naval Academy.

Robin Owens has been the Conductor of the Richardson Community Band since May 2017. Prior to her affiliation with RCB, she served a variety of North Texas school districts, including Assistant Director of Bands at Richardson Junior High in Richardson, TX; Plano East Senior High in Plano, TX; Sherman High School in Sherman, TX; Director of Bands at Apollo Junior High in Richardson, TX; and most recently Wilson Middle School in Plano, TX.

Robin received her Bachelor of Music Education from Baylor University and a Master of Music from Texas A&M Commerce. Aside from teaching and conducting, Robin also performs professionally with Dallas Winds, playing contralto and contrabass clarinets.



Jane Chambers joined the Richardson Community Band as a member of the flute section in the Fall of 1977. She has served as Associate Conductor of the Band since 1991. In addition to her conducting duties, Jane also writes the announcer's scripts and Program Notes for our concerts. She is a career music educator and is Director of Music at the Ursuline Academy of Dallas. Professional recognitions include 1997 Teacher of the Year and Who's Who of American Teachers. Jane holds a Bachelor and Master of Music Education from the University of North Texas and is Past President of the Texas Private School Music Educators Association (TPSMEA).

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
