SPECIAL GUESTS

SAX ON THE SIDE SAXOPHONE QUARTET was formed in the fall of 2010 from the saxophone section of the Richardson Community Band. Their repertoire includes transcriptions, holiday and pop selections, and more serious compositions. They perform at a variety of events and venues throughout the north Dallas metroplex including holiday parties and benefit concerts, and at senior resident facilities.

The quartet has been featured with the Richardson Community Band in their Eisemann Concert Series, their senior center concerts, and their outdoor summer series; and each year in early November, the quartet performs a mini-concert in the lobby of Eisemann Center for the Performing Arts in honor of the birthday of Adolphe Sax, the inventor of the saxophone. The quartet is comprised of David Janes on soprano saxophone, Clarine "Skipp" Andresen on alto saxophone, Stanton Goldberg on tenor saxophone, and Scott Williams on baritone saxophone.



MADELEINE OWENS took her first dance class at the age of two, and she has since never stopped loving the art of dance. Joining the professional tap dance community in 2012, she began her career by studying rhythm tap with Katelyn Harris, who invited her to join the professional company Rhythmic Souls located in Dallas, Texas.

She earned a bachelor's degree in dance at Texas Woman's University. Madeleine is a "Renaissance" woman; indeed, in addition to dance, she is an accomplished artist and musician.

Madeleine is now in her second season with Tapestry Dance Company under the direction of Acia Gray. She has been on the faculty of several tap festivals and intensives, including Tapestry's own Soul to Sole and Rhythmic Soul's summer festival in 2017. She has taught tap, ballet, jazz, musical theatre, modern and contemporary for eight years, and taught ages ranging from 2 to 70. Tap dance is her passion, and she is grateful that she is a part of Tapestry's new season.

A resident company of The Long Center, Tapestry is a professional, non-profit dance organization founded in 1989 by rhythm tap dancer Acia Gray and ballet/jazz artist Deirdre Strand for the purpose of developing a foundation in multi-form dance performance and education. Initially a performing company of three, the organization has expanded to a professional company of seven resident artists, a diversified administrative and production support staff and a pre-professional and adult training facility in Austin, TX sharing the unique Strand/Gray training syllabus.



MICKEY OWENS taught high school band for 35 years and is now a private clarinet teacher. He has extensive professional performance experience in classical, jazz, "society" dance band, and recording activities. He is presently is a member of the Dallas Winds, appearing on 16 commercially released recordings in the Reference and DWS catalogs. Mr. Owens sings in the choir at The Episcopal Church of the

Transfiguration in Dallas, and also serves as the President of the Texas Private School Music Educators Association. Mickey is married to Robin, the conductor or the Richardson Community Band. They have two children; Calvin, a gifted clarinetist and a Production Engineer for Facebook; and Maddie, an outstanding bassoonist, and a professional tap dancer with the Tapestry Dance Company in Austin, TX.

PROGRAM NOTES

Composer Malcom Arnold attended the Royal College of Music in London where he studied composition and trumpet and later became first chair of the London Philharmonic Orchestra trumpet section. His first set of **ENGLISH DANCES**, **Op. 27**, was written in 1950, but does not contain real folk tunes. Instead, Arnold took inspiration from the general style of English folk music. The popularity of the work led to **ENGLISH DANCES**, **SET II**, **Op. 33**, composed in 1951.

Some of the greatest musical shows feature elaborate dance numbers that help interpret the overall story and its characters, giving audience members more ways to be captivated by the tale. The beloved Broadway and Hollywood musicals *The Sound of Music, THE KING AND I, South Pacific,* and *Oklahoma!* by the amazing duo of Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein are matched by the remarkable *My Fair Lady, Gigi, Camelot,* and *Brigadoon* by **Alan Lerner and Frederick Loewe**. All contained brilliantly choreographed scenes that combined exuberant singing and fancy footwork. A combination of famous dances by both pairs of musical geniuses show that the invitation SHALL WE DANCE? might lead to I COULD HAVE DANCED ALL NIGHT!

Reinhold Glière was one of the most influential Russian composers during the transition from Czarist to Soviet Russia. His ballet THE RED POPPY was written in 1927 and tells of an uprising on board a Chinese ship and the successful intervention of Russian sailors. The **RUSSIAN SAILORS DANCE** is the best-known excerpt from the work and is founded on a popular dance-song called YABLOCHKA (Little Apple). Building upon the rustic folk tune, the work progresses to an exhilarating finale through several variations.

The fears and hopes of seventeen dancers auditioning for spots in a Broadway show are explored in the award-winning musical **A CHORUS LINE**. The musical score by Marvin Hamlish and Edward Kleban featured one hit tune after another including *I Hope I Get It, Sing!, One,* and *What I Did for Love*. The 1975 show won the Pulitzer Prize and the Tony Award for Best Musical.

COURTLY AIRS AND DANCES is a suite of Renaissance dances characteristic to five different European countries, and composer Ron Nelson uses a different Renaissance style for each movement. The collection opens with a fanfare-like *Intrada* followed by *Basse Dance* (France), *Pavane* (England), *Saltarello* (Italy), *Sarabande* (Spain) and *Allemande* (Germany). Ron Nelson composed the work in 1995 on commission from the Hill Country Middle School Band in Austin, Texas.

SYMPHONIC DANCE #3 – FIESTA is one of five symphonic dances commissioned by the San Antonio Symphony Orchestra to celebrate its 25th anniversary in 1964. Each of the dances represents the spirit of a different time and place in the history of San Antonia and FIESTA represents the excitement and color of the city's many Latin American celebrations. Composer Clifton Williams later rescored this work for band.

The lineage of the jukebox musical MAMA MIA winds through two feature films from 2008 and 2018 and a 1999 Broadway hit to the sounds of the Swedish pop quartet ABBA, founded almost 50 years ago. Dancing Queen lives on through the story of a 17-year-old girl on a nightclub dance floor—lost in the music and the moment. Catchy and ecstatic, the song captures the carefree bliss of youth and was a #1 hit, not just in Sweden and Great Britain, but in countries as diverse as Mexico, New Zealand, Belgium, South Africa and the United States.

Although French composer Georges Bizet never set foot in Spain, he succeeded in conveying the fire and flavor of the story about the downfall of a naïve Spanish soldier under the wiles of the tempestuous gypsy *Carmen*. The music from his production is so well known that virtually anyone who hears the complete opera for the first time will recognize most of its numbers. *The Dance Boheme* from Act II, known as the **GYPSY DANCE**, is created from a melody that is repeated several times, varying the orchestration, and becoming faster with each repetition.

According to a story circulated among former Sousa Band members, John Philip Sousa's daughter Priscilla gave him the idea for the **GLIDING GIRL TANGO**. She had just returned from Europe and reported that the tango was the rage there. Priscilla gave him a demonstration by gliding around the room, and he transferred her graceful motions to music.

Prior to her affiliation with RCB, she served a variety of North Texas school districts, including Assistant Director of Bands at Richardson Junior High in Richardson, TX; Plano East Senior High in Plano, TX; Sherman High School in Sherman, TX; Director of Bands at Apollo Junior High in Richardson, TX; and most recently Wilson Middle School in Plano, TX.

Robin received her Bachelor of Music Education from Baylor University and a Master of Music from Texas A&M Commerce. Aside from teaching and conducting, Robin also performs professionally with Dallas Winds, playing contralto and contrabass clarinets.



Jane Chambers joined the Richardson Community Band as a member of the flute section in the Fall of 1977. She has served as Associate Conductor of the Band since 1991. In addition to her conducting duties, Jane also writes the announcer's scripts and Program Notes for our concerts. She is a career music educator and is Director of Music at the Ursuline Academy of Dallas. Professional recognitions include 1997 Teacher of the Year and Who's Who of American Teachers. Jane holds a Bachelor and Master of Music Education from the University of North Texas and is Past President of the Texas Private School Music Educators Association (TPSMEA).

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
