## SPECIAL GUESTS



#### DAVID BARRIENTOS, CLARINETIST

Clarinetist David Barrientos embraces a performing and teaching career, presenting master classes, clinics, and recitals for almost 30 years. A native of Chile, he is a graduate of the University of Chile with a Bachelors in Arts, The University of Utah with a Masters in Music, Texas Tech University with a Masters in Arts (literature) and Doctorate in Musical Arts. He has also completed a Ph.D. in Fine Arts (ABD) at Texas Tech University. Dr. Barrientos is the recipient of more than a dozen of grants offered by the Chilean Government and a similar number of scholarships and fellowships to pursue graduate studies, research, and performances in the USA and abroad. Dr.Barrientos has performed in Chile, USA, Brazil, Spain, Italy, Germany, Belgium, and Moldova. A versatile performer he has played in bands, orchestras, and chamber ensembles performing symphonic, ballet, opera, musicals, and wind band repertoire. Since 2016 he is appointed as a bilingual teacher in Dallas Independent School District where he teaches pre-kinder level. Dr. Barrientos joined the Richardson Community band in February 2017.



#### KIM J. CAMPBELL, CONCERT HOST

Kim J. Campbell founded the Dallas Winds with the late Howard Dunn in 1985, and is the organization's Executive Director. Mr. Campbell has served as the Associate Producer of 22 albums with the Dallas Winds for the Reference Recordings, Klavier Records, Crystal Records and Widget Records labels. At Southern Methodist University, Kim was the General Manager of The McFarlin Memorial Auditorium for four seasons and Facilities Manager at the Meadows School of the Arts from 1986 to 1993.

During eighteen years as a professional trombonist, Kim was a regular member of symphony, ballet and opera orchestras in Dallas, Fort Worth and Mexico City.

As a freelance musician he performed with numerous artists in a wide variety of ensembles while touring throughout the United States, Canada, Europe and Mexico.

Kim majored in music performance at North Texas State University and maintained a private music studio in the Dallas/Ft. Worth area for seven years teaching trombone, euphonium and tuba.

### **PROGRAM NOTES**

When President Woodrow Wilson declared war on Germany in 1917, the American public wasn't sure it wanted to send its soldiers into combat. Yet, once war was declared, public opinion shifted in support of the president's decision and a new wave of popular patriotic songs both reflected and contributed to that change. George M. Cohan (1878-1942), a successful Broadway producer, performer, lyricist and composer, wrote **OVER THERE** on his way into work, stirred by the news on April 6, 1917 of the country's entrance into World War I. President Wilson praised **OVER THERE** as "a genuine inspiration to all American manhood."

By the end of World War II, the U.S. had sent more than 4 million troops to help in the Allied victory. Meanwhile, 116 million Americans back at home also played a crucial role in the fight, requiring a level of involvement, commitment, and sacrifice unknown in previous conflicts. Without the steadfast support of **THE HOMEFRONT** America could not have won the war. We remember a special period in our nation's history with some treasured songs of the era that includes *Thanks for the Memory*, *I'll Be Seeing You* and *White Cliffs of Dover*.

**CONCERT FANTASIA on Motives from "Rigoletto"** was composed by Luigi Bassi (1833-1871), an Italian clarinetist and composer. During the 19th century, the virtuoso performer was a prominent feature of romantic music concerts, so performers on all instruments commissioned new works or composed music designed to display their unique technical abilities. Bassi created 27 works for the clarinet that included fifteen opera fantasies or transcriptions. Giuseppe Verdi's **RIGOLETTO** provides passages from the Introduction as well as the opera's three movements for a tour de force work for the clarinet soloist.

The **QUEEN OF SOUL**, Aretha Louise Franklin (1942-2018), defined the golden age of soul music in the 1960's. A gifted singer, pianist, and songwriter, Franklin began performing gospel music with her father's traveling revival show but went on to release several popular singles such as *Respect, Freeway of Love*, and *Chain of Fools*, which are now considered classics. In 1987, Franklin became the first woman inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. In addition, she received a Kennedy Center Honor in 1994, a National Medal of Arts in 1999, and the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2005. Franklin would electrify a crowd of more than one million with her performance of *My Country 'Tis of Thee* at the 2009 presidential inauguration of Barak Obama.

If there's one thing to know about Texas, it's that we are never without a healthy dose of state pride, and it shows by the sheer multitude of songs about Texas people, its places and its history. The natural wonders of the great state have inspired artists and musicians to create numerous tributes to our cities, mountains, canyons and the rivers flowing along our northern and southern borders. Celebrated composer Ralph Hermann (1914-1994) presented us with **TEXAS PORTRAIT**, an original work of new and inspired themes that forgive his Wisconsin roots and qualify him to be a naturalized Texan.

**EINE KLEINE NACHTMUSIK**, also known as **A Little Night Music**, came from a thirty-one-year-old Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756-1791). Originally a serenade for string ensemble, the work enjoyed immense popularity from concerts in Vienna's parks and gardens. As the piece was composed near the end of his life, Mozart never published **EINE KLEINE NACHTMUSIK** during his career, and only in 1827, forty years after it was written, were copies finally available. The work remains among the most frequently performed and iconic of all Classical Age compositions.

**THE LION KING**, produced by the Walt Disney Studios in 1994, was the first Disney animated feature not obviously based on an existing work. The film's score by composers and lyricists Hans Zimmer, Tim Rice and Elton John won Academy Awards for Best Original Score and Best Original Song (*Can You Feel the Love Tonight*). **THE LION KING** musical, featuring actors in animal costumes, opened on Broadway on November 13, 1997. The third adaptation of the award-winning phenomenon was released in the summer of 2019 with computer generated but photorealistic imagery.

Popularly known as **THE ENIGMA VARIATIONS**, Edward Elgar's (1857-1934) **Variations on An Original Theme, Op. 36** was composed for orchestra in 1899 and bore the dedication "To My Friends Pictured Within." As only initials or nicknames were given to the fourteen short movements, the work remained a mystery for many years to all but Elgar's own circle of friends. Among his acquaintances depicted were organist George Robertson Sinclair, great friend and publisher A.J. Jaeger, and the composer's wife, Alice. The **FINALE** is identified with the initials E.D.U. which are a paraphrase of "Edoo," Alice Elgar's pet name for her husband.

John Philip Sousa's (1854-1932) 1896 operetta **EL CAPITAN** was one of the earliest musicals by an American composer to have a successful run on Broadway. Sousa saw the opportunity to create a new march by sewing together several tunes from the operetta. The march was completed on April 30, 1896, just two weeks after the Boston première of the operetta, and it quickly became a regular part of the Sousa Band repertoire.

The first version of **HOUND DOG** was released in 1953 by Willie Mae "Big Mama" Thornton (1926-1984), a Rhythm and Blues singer from Alabama. The song was written specifically for her by Jerry Leiber and Mike Stoller and became the biggest hit of Thornton's career. In July 1956, Elvis Presley (1935-1977) recorded his own version of **HOUND DOG** for RCA Records that featured a fast tempo, prominent drumming, and a forceful vocal energy associated with the emerging Rock and Roll sound. The record became a massive crossover success that appealed to millions of young people, both black and white—a significant achievement in pre-Civil Rights America.
