He earned his way through college as a local drive-time personality on KGFW radio in Kearney, spinning records nightly at a "real" 70's discothèque called Dickey Duggan's Dance Hall and Saloon, and providing voiceover talent for the Nebraska Television Network.

Upon graduation from college, Barry pursued a career in higher education. He served as an admissions counselor at his alma mater, director of admissions at Northern State University in Aberdeen, South Dakota, and director of enrollment services at the University of Texas at Dallas. In addition, he has been an adjunct faculty member, teaching speech communication, at Collin County Community College.

You know what they say, "What goes around, comes around." After retiring from academia, he's back enjoying life on-the-air at WRR Classical 101 in Dallas.



RCB is excited to introduce our Conductor-Elect, **ROBIN OWENS**. Robin has served a variety of North Texas school districts as Assistant Director of Bands at Richardson Junior High in Richardson, TX; Plano East Senior Hight in Plano, TX; Sherman High School in Sherman, TX; and Director of Bands at Apollo Junior High in Richardson; and most recently Wilson Middle School in Plano.

Aside from teaching and conducting, Robin also performs professionally with Dallas Winds, playing contralto and contrabass clarinets.

Robin's tenure with RCB will officially begin at our Senior Center concert on May 17.

PROGRAM NOTES

CARNEGIE ANTHEM pays tribute to the one of the world's most prestigious performance venues and vibrant New York City that calls it home. A brilliant fanfare by William Owens (1963 -) gives way to a tranquil, engaging middle section that is rhythmically driven and symbolic of the non-stop activity of a bustling metropolis. After returning to the opening theme, the music concludes with a glorious flourish. How do you get to Carnegie Hall? The answer, of course, is practice!

AN AMERICAN ELEGY was composed in memory of those who lost their lives at Columbine High School on April 20, 1999, and to honor the survivors. Composer Frank Ticheli (1958 -) said: "I was moved and honored by this commission invitation, and deeply inspired by the circumstances surrounding it. Rarely has a work revealed itself to me with such powerful speed and clarity. The first eight bars of the main melody came to me fully formed in a dream. It is offered as a tribute to their great strength and courage in the face of a terrible tragedy. I hope the work can also serve as one reminder of how fragile and precious life is and how intimately connected we all are as human beings." The work was premiered by the Columbine High School Band on April 23, 2000, with Ticheli as guest conductor.

Samuel Barber (1910 - 1981) was a titan of 20th century music, earning two Pulitzer Prizes and the Henry Hadley Medal of the National Association for American Composers and Conductors. After being drafted into the Army in 1942, he composed **COMMANDO MARCH** while attached to a service band unit. Dedicated to the soldiers, the march was first performed on May 23, 1943, by the Army Air Corps Band in Atlantic City, New Jersey. Barber's only published work for band, it is regarded as one of the cornerstone marches of the wind band repertoire.

WEST SIDE STORY brought a new dimension to Shakespeare's ageless love story of Romeo and Juliet and the underlying dynamics of social and racial strife found in the conflict between the Sharks and the Jets. It was classical music without attempting to be opera. The songs Leonard Bernstein (1918 - 1990) composed for the musical were influenced by classical, jazz, Latin and other popular styles. The show's dark theme, sophisticated music, and extended dance scenes marked a turning point in American musical theatre.

Ernest L. Thayer's *Casey at the Bat* is the most famous sports poem ever written. Published on June 3, 1888, in the San Francisco Examiner, the poem's rise to popular acclaim was largely due to the efforts of DeWolf Hopper, an actor-singer-comedian who, in 1899, was appearing in a comic opera in New York City. Hopper learned that members of the Chicago White Stockings and the New York Giants were going to attend one of his performances so he decided to include something for the baseball players. That evening he recited the poem between acts of the opera and the audience was delighted. The recitation became a part of Hopper's repertoire and he later estimated that during his career he performed the poem over 10,000 times. With an added musical score by Jeff Holmes, THE BASEBALL STORY: NO IFS, ANDS, OR BUNTS captures the joy and desperation of the true baseball fanatic.

Frank Sinatra (1915-1998) was one of the most successful musical artists of all time, selling more than 150 million records worldwide. His career began in the swing era as a singer with the Harry James and Tommy Dorsey bands. Stephen Bulla's (1953 -) arrangement SINATRA! features four of his numerous hits. Come Fly with Me was the title song for a 1958 album while Witchcraft appeared on a 1957 Sinatra recording. Another album title song, That's Life, was a top five hit in 1966. Fly Me to the Moon became synonymous with NASA's space program after Sinatra's 1964 recording. It was played on the Apollo 10 mission as it orbited the moon, and again on Apollo 11 astronaut Buzz Aldrin's cassette player after he stepped onto the moon.

In 2008, the RCB wanted to express its thanks and appreciation to Conductor George Jones for 25 years of dedication and service to the band, but what do you buy? The answer soon became obvious – we give him music! Acclaimed composer John Wasson (1956 -) was commissioned to create a work that would capture some of George's jovial personality. The result was the exciting **SILVER CELEBRATION OVERTURE** that had its world premiere at Richardson's Charles W. Eisemann Center for Performing Arts. Not only has this score been a unique gift to George and the Richardson Community Band, but its publication allows bands to enjoy the work for years to come.

It was the spacious skies and purple mountain majesties of Pikes Peak in Colorado that inspired Katherine Lee Bates to write the poem **AMERICA THE BEAUTIFUL** in 1893. Although it was not intended to be sung, the poem's meter fit several tunes popular at the time. It is most closely associated with organist Samuel Augustus Ward's *Materna*. Today, the renowned band setting by Carmen Dragon (1914-1984) is partnered with the equally beloved words of **THE FLAG SPEAKS**.

Austria had its Waltz King - Johann Strauss Jr. - and America had its March King - John Philip Sousa (1854-1932). He was known the world over as a band leader and the composer of dozens of marches, as well as operettas, orchestral suites, and songs. Sousa penned **SEMPER FIDELIS** in 1888, and took its title from the motto of the U.S. Marine Corps: Semper fidelis - Always Faithful. It was dedicated to those who inspired it - the officers and men of the United States Marine Corps. In Sousa's own words: "I wrote Semper Fidelis one night while in tears, after my comrades of the Marine Corps had sung their famous hymn at Quantico." Sousa himself considered it his best march ever written.

George W. Jones first served as the summer interim conductor for the Richardson Community Band during the first summer in Texas in 1977. He was appointed as Conductor of the Band and conducted his first concert on May 8, 1983. During his tenure as conductor of the band, the band has grown both in size and popularity. He instituted the band's Summer Concert Series, which has become a favorite summer activity for families across the Metroplex.

Since 1997, George has served as the Director of Fine Arts for the Garland Independent School District. Prior to assuming this administrative position, he served as a band director in Garland for 18 years.

In 2010, George was presented with the "Real Heroes Award" by the Richardson Coalition for his service as conductor of the RCB. The Richardson Arts Alliance presented him with the "Lifetime Achievement Award" in 2011. He was recently named "Texas Music Administrator of the Year" by the Texas Music Administrator Conference.

Mr. Jones holds a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Illinois Wesleyan University and a Master of Music from Southern Methodist University. He is a member of the Texas Music Educators Association, the Texas Bandmasters Association, the Texas Music Administrators Conference, and Phi Beta Mu honorary music fraternity.



Jane Chambers joined the Richardson Community Band as a member of the flute section in the Fall of 1977. She has served as Associate Conductor of the Band since 1991. In addition to her conducting duties, Jane also writes the announcer's scripts for our concerts. She is a career music educator and is Director of Music at the Ursuline Academy of Dallas. Professional recognitions include 1997 Teacher of the Year and Who's Who of American Teachers. Jane holds a Bachelor and Master of Music Education from the University of North Texas and is Immediate Past President of the Texas Private School Music Educators Association (TPSMEA).

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
