

AMY BISHOP - Concert Host

Amy Bishop not only wears the hat as WRR's midday host, but also as its Director of Marketing and Promotions.

Prior to returning to Dallas, Amy was the arts and culture beat reporter for Houston's NPR affiliate and announcer at the former classical music radio station. As an award-winning arts journalist, her stories could often

be heard statewide and nationally on Texas Standard and NPR's Here & Now.

She started her career in radio at the age of 19 as a student DJ for KNTU at the University of North Texas, eventually working her way up to the Program Director position by her senior year. Amy graduated with a German degree, but had her sights set on continuing her radio career after college and worked in various capacities at a mixed bag of radio stations in the Dallas/Fort Worth area. Her other radio experience includes working as a reporter/anchor/airborne traffic reporter for News Radio 1080 KRLD and as a reporter/anchor for the Texas State Network. Prior to leaving for a job in Houston in 2012, she was WRR's midday host and earned a spot on the City of Dallas' Wall of Honor for two years in a row. She is thrilled that things have come full circle by having the opportunity to share her love of classical music with WRR's listeners.

In addition to classical, Amy's musical tastes are broad. She is a self-proclaimed Beatlemaniac and a bona fide Anglophile, loving all things British. She often describes herself as a coffee-addicted crazy cat lady who loves to dance. She is a regular contributor to *Arts and Culture Texas Magazine* and an ardent advocate for supporting arts and cultural organizations.



IAN GILL - Guest Vocalist

lan Gill is a conductor, singer and guitarist living in Richardson, TX. He has conducted and performed in 31 states as well as throughout England, Germany, Hungary, Austria, Poland and Australia and has worked with some of the most well-respected conductors and musicians of the modern era such as Dale Warland, Dr. Don Moses, Dr. Donald Neuen, Dr. Lynne Gackle, Vijay Singh, Dr. Tim Sharp, Dr. Richard Zielinski and quitarist George Benson. He has conducted children's choirs, youth

choirs, adult choirs, community choirs, church choirs, youth orchestras, the Norman Philharmonic Orchestra (Norman, OK) and the 2016 Southwest Oklahoma Circle the State with Song festival choir. He currently serves as the Associate Director of Music at First United Methodist Church of Richardson. He is also the Music and Artistic Director of the Richardson Community Chorale. The RCC is a 60 member non-auditioned choral ensemble that strives to present quality choral music for Richardson and the surrounding communities. They provide FREE concerts to the public throughout the fall and spring. Mr. Gill is a member of the Eclectic Celtic band Five Second Rule and enjoys playing guitar and mandolin as well as singing with those incredible musicians. Ian is married to Grace, a Richardson native. They have a four year old son named Cooper. Ian and Grace both love good food, good music and good company with friends and family.

PROGRAM NOTES

The Revolutionary War period was an era defined by immense change and music during the age was no exception. Songs about the settler's serene daily lives gave way to military music and musicians entering the colonial music scene. In **REVOLUTIONARY MARCH**, arranged by Robin Owens, several melodies from differing sources and traditions are brought together to symbolize the fiercely patriotic marching songs heard during the trying times of a new nation. Included are *Yankee Doodle* and *Chester*, two familiar songs that helped define our heritage and nationalistic spirit.

SALVATION IS CREATED is a Russian orthodox-style choral hymn composed by Pavel Grigorievich Chesnokov (Tschesnokoff) (1877-1944) in 1912. This work was one of the very last sacred works he composed before being forced to create secular music by the increasingly oppressive leadership of the Soviet Union's Cultural Bureau. The text for the emotional song was based on a passage from Psalm 74-"But you, O God, are my king from of old; you bring salvation upon the earth."

A small town called Taranto in Italy's "boot" is the birthplace of this dance commonly known among locals as the "dance of the spider." During the 15th to 17th centuries, Wolf Spider bites were plentiful and peasants comprised most of the victims because they had to work in the fields. Symptoms associated with the spider bites included blurry vision, fainting spells, uncontrollable tremors and shaking. The "tarantula" victim would take up an agitated dance until they perspired out the poison left by the spider. Although this emergency treatment was not very effective, the whirlwind motion and accompanying music evolved into a dance of flirtation and celebration as found in Alfred Reed's fiery setting of the TARANTELLA.

When composer George teamed up with his older brother Ira as lyricist, the Gershwins became the dominant Broadway songwriters, creating infectious rhythmic numbers and poignant ballads that still hold an extraordinary place in American musical history. **EMBRACEABLE YOU** was written in 1928 for an unpublished operetta named *East Is West*. It was eventually released in 1930 and included in the Broadway musical *Girl Crazy*, where it was performed by Ginger Rogers in a song and dance routine choreographed by Fred Astaire.

The voice of classical music and the arts in North Texas, WRR-FM 101.1 is the oldest radio station in Texas and the second oldest operating radio station in the United States. First licensed on August 5, 1921, the station recently celebrated its 100th birthday by spotlighting the special programs and personalities that Friends of WRR know and love – Breakfast with Barry, At Work with Amy, The Homestretch, Classical Kids, Reel Music, and many more.

A WRR tradition for over 25 years has been the "March of the Day" – a rousing march selected each weekday and broadcast at 7:35 am to bring positive energy to the morning commute. Nearly a dozen of composer David Lovrien's marches have been featured in this broadcast slot over the years, and he repaid that kindness with a special gift to the station. His appropriately titled MARCH OF THE DAY is unique in that it is both a march and a radio jingle, reminiscent of early broadcasting days.

Rivers are the lifeblood of human civilization, supplying water to cities, farms, and factories. They provide us with food, recreation, and commerce, and were the links for a growing nation. **AMERICAN RIVERSONGS** provides a nostalgic look at an earlier time in our country's history. The work opens with a rousing setting of "Down the River" that is followed with a dramatic treatment of "Shenandoah." A brass band is then heard in a square-dance rendition of "The Glendy Burk" but is soon joined with a second melody, a Creole tune likely from Louisiana's delta region, by the piccolo and flutes. **AMERICAN RIVERSONGS** captures the spirit of the river people in a rowdy, foot-stomping finale.

Described as a cautionary tale about love, friendship and trust, the Broadway blockbuster **WICKED** revealed that there really are two sides to every story. Based on the characters and setting of L. Frank Baum's 1900 novel *The Wonderful Wizard of Oz* and the 1939 Metro-Goldwyn Mayer film *The Wizard of Oz*, the musical is told from the perspective of the witches in the Land of Oz before Dorothy arrived from Kansas. Elphaba (the Wicked Witch of the West) and Galinda (later renamed Glinda the Good Witch) share a school friendship that eventually collapses under the pressures of their different personalities, viewpoints, and rivalry over the same love interest. Winning three Tony Awards in 2004, **WICKED** is still enchanting countless audiences with Stephen Schwartz's magical score.

Regardless of John Phillip Sousa's distinguished military career, his **GLORY OF THE YANKEE NAVY** was not composed to honor America's sea-faring armed forces but his love of musical theater. Singer and actress Blanch Ring, the toast of Broadway in the early 1900's, was prepared to open in a new production called *The Yankee Girl* when the director decided the show needed a march. Sousa agreed to write one, with lyrics by Kenneth S. Clark, that he dedicated to Ms. Ring. The tune, one of The March King's most musically distinctive creations, underwenta number of title changes that included "*Uncle Sam's Navy*" and "*The Honor of the Yankee Navy*" before its premier in 1910.

Prior to her affiliation with RCB, she served a variety of North Texas school districts, including Assistant Director of Bands at Richardson Junior High in Richardson, TX; Plano East Senior High in Plano, TX; Sherman High School in Sherman, TX; Director of Bands at Apollo Junior High in Richardson, TX; and most recently Wilson Middle School in Plano, TX.

Robin received her Bachelor of Music Education from Baylor University and a Master of Music from Texas A&M Commerce. Aside from teaching and conducting, Robin also performs professionally with Dallas Winds, playing contralto and contrabass clarinets.



Jane Chambers joined the Richardson Community Band as a member of the flute section in the Fall of 1977. She has served as Associate Conductor of the Band since 1991. In addition to her conducting duties, Jane also writes the announcer's scripts and Program Notes for our concerts. She is a career music educator and is Director of Music at the Ursuline Academy of Dallas. Professional recognitions include 1997 Teacher of the Year and Who's Who of American Teachers. Jane holds a Bachelor and Master of Music Education from the University of North Texas and is Past President of the Texas Private School Music Educators Association (TPSMEA).
